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## **1. INTRODUCTION**

This is a 3x2 matrix switch that can handle multi-format signals and can be expanded with module cards for various uses. The two most common video input interfaces (HDMI, USB-C) are included along with a pair of HDMI outputs and a single analogue audio breakout port, providing the ultimate in source compatibility and flexibility.

All inputs and outputs on this unit are compatible with HDCP2.2 and can support resolutions of up to 4K@60Hz (4:4:4, 8-bit or 4:2:0, 12-bit HDR). The included USB-C input complies with the USB 3.0 standard and supports audio/video bypass, and device charging, as well as the ability to provide a network connection.

This matrix also includes USB3.0 hub functionality with three host ports and two device ports for flexible KVM configuration. With the USB extension, this product is ideal for remote conferences, meetings, and education scenarios. This unit is controllable via front panel controls, WebGUI, Telnet and RS-232.

### **4. SYSTEM REQUIREMENTS**

- HDMI or USB-C source equipment such as media players, video game consoles, laptops, or set-top boxes.
- HDMI receiving equipment such as HDTVs, monitors, or audio amplifiers.
- *III* The use of Premium High Speed HDMI cables is highly recommended.
- CYP Module slot is designed for use with official SDM branded modules only.



## 6. OPERATION CONTROLS AND FUNCTIONS

#### 6.1 Front Panel



- **POWER LED:** This LED will illuminate to indicate the unit is on and receiving power.
- RS-232 CTL 3-pin Terminal Block: Connect directly to a PC, laptop, or other serial control device with a 3-pin adapter cable to send RS-232 commands to control the unit, or to receive event automation RS-232 commands from the unit.
- EINE OUT Port: Connect to powered speakers, headphones, or an amplifier for analogue stereo audio output extracted from the selected HDMI output (LPCM 2.0 sources only).
- **USB Host Port (Type-B):** Connect directly to a standard USB host such as a PC or laptop to extend their USB functionality to all currently connected USB devices.

Note: Only active when the USB mode selection is set to "USB".


- **5** USB 1 & 2 Device Ports (Type-A): Connect directly to standard USB devices such as a mouse, keyboard or flash drive to extend their USB functionality to the currently active USB host port.
- **6** OUT A & B LEDs: The illuminated LED indicates which source is currently selected for each output.
- **OUT A & OUT B Buttons:** Press either button to sequentially switch through the available inputs for the associated HDMI output.
- 8 SLOT & USB-C & USB LEDs: The illuminated LED indicates which USB host port or CYP module card slot is currently active.
- **USB Select Button:** Press this button to select between USB host ports or CYP module card. "SLOT" selects the CYP Module Card installed in the rear of the unit, "USB-C" selects the USB Type-C port on the rear of the unit, and "USB" selects the USB Type-B port on the front





of the unit.

6.2 Rear Panel



Module Card Slot : Install a compatible SDM branded module card to expand the output functionality of the unit (for example, adding wireless receiving functions).

Note: When no module card is installed, this slot should always be covered with a blank cover plate.



USB-C IN Port: Connect to USB Type-C host or video source equipment such as a PC or laptop. When the USB-C port has "Super Speed" support active, this port can support 4K30 A/V, Ethernet, and USB simultaneously. When "Super Speed" is disabled, this port will support full bandwidth 4K60 A/V content but USB data functionality will be limited to USB 2.0 levels.

Note: Not all devices with USB Type-C ports can support video output. Please verify that the device supports video output from the USB Type-C port before attempting to use it as a video source.

**B** HDMI IN Port: Connect to HDMI source equipment such as media player, game console, or set-top box. DVI source are supported with the use of an HDMI to DVI adapter.

A HDMI OUT A & B Ports: Connect to HDMI TVs, monitors, or amplifiers for digital video and audio output.

**5** LAN Port: Connect directly, or through a network switch, to your PC/ laptop to control the unit via Telnet/WebGUI and to extend the network across the USB Type-B and Type-C ports.

Note: The USB Type-C port must be in "Super Speed" mode to support Ethernet extension.

6 DC 24V Port: Plug the 24V DC power adapter into this port and connect it to an AC wall outlet for power.





#### **6.3 Module Card Installation**

To install this module card into your unit, it must have at least one available CYP Module Slot.


Ensure that the anti-static procedure is completed before handling the module card.

(1) Prior to installation, power the unit completely off.



(2) Remove the dummy faceplate that is covering the card module slot by unscrewing both screws.

Note: Be sure to store the dummy faceplate, and its screws, somewhere safe, in case you need to use them again later.



(3) Align the card with the guiderails to each side of the module slot, and gently slide the module card into the slot until its faceplate is flush with the back of the unit.



- (4) Secure the module to the unit by using the supplied screws.
- (5) The unit may now be powered back on. The card's power LED will light up to indicate it is receiving power. In most cases, the card will be automatically detected by the unit and be available for use.




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- **6.4 Module Card Removal**
- (1) Prior to removal, power the unit completely off.



(2) Completely unscrew both screws.



(3) Gently pull the card straight out of the module slot using the provided handles.



- (4) Cover the module slot with a dummy faceplate and tighten both screws.
- (5) The unit may now be powered back on.

#### *III* Device Discovery

Please obtain the "Device Discovery" software from your authorised dealer and save it in a directory where you can easily find it.

Connect the unit and your PC/Laptop to the same active network and execute the "Device Discovery" software. Click on "Find Devices on Internet" and a list of devices connected to the local network will show up indicating their current IP address.

Note: This unit defaults to DHCP mode. The current IP address can be verified via the RS-232 if the Device Discovery software is not available.

- IP Mode: If you choose, you can alter the static IP network settings for the device, or switch the unit into DHCP mode to automatically obtain proper network settings from a local DHCP server. To switch to DHCP mode, please select DHCP from the IP mode drop-down, then click "Save" followed by "Reboot".
- 2) WebGUI Hotkey: Once you are satisfied with the network settings, you may use them to connect via Telnet or WebGUI. The network information window provides a convenient link to launch the WebGUI directly.





#### **WebGUI Overview**

After connecting to the WebGUI's address in a web browser, the login screen will appear. Please enter the appropriate user name and password then click "Submit" to log in.

Clicking the red "Admin-Logout" tab will automatically log the currently connected user out of the WebGUI and return to login page.





#### 6.6.1 AV Switch Tab

This tab provides A/V routing control, HDCP management, auto switch control, analogue audio controls, and I/O renaming options. To assign a new A/V route, select one or both output buttons on the left and then click on the button of the preferred input source on the right. As each button is selected they will become highlighted. The new route will become active immediately and the routing information displayed on the buttons will change accordingly.

- 1) **Output:** These buttons display each output's name and details about the currently routed inputs. Clicking on the "Edit" icon (豪) opens up the Output Edit window.
- 2) Input: Buttons for selecting the input to route to an output. Details about each input's name and current sync/HDCP settings are also displayed here. Clicking on the "Edit" icon (♣) opens up the Input Edit window.
- **3) Auto Switch:** Auto input switching may be enabled or disabled by clicking on the On/Off slider to toggle the setting.

Note: This setting affects the source selection behavior for output A only.

**4) Output Edit:** Provides control over the name of the output and, for output A only, control over the 4K downscale options.

- Set Output Name: To rename the output, type the new name in the space provided in the edit window. The name can be up to 32 characters long. Click the "Save" button to confirm the change.
- 4K2K Downscale: Select the 4K to 1080p downscaling behavior for output A.
  - **Pass Through:** Send all signals through without any modification.
  - **Auto:** Only activate the downscaling function if the EDID of the connected display does not support 4K.
  - 1080P: Downscales all 4K sources to 1080p.

Note: This option is available for output A only. When active, no framerate conversion is performed. For example, a 4K@24Hz source would be output as 1080p@24Hz.

5) Input Edit: Provides individual control over the name of each input as well as the behavior of HDCP on that input.

- Set Input Name: To rename an input, type the new name in the space provided in the edit window. The name can be up to 32 characters long. Click the "Save" button to confirm the change.
- **HDCP:** Selects the HDCP logic to use with this HDMI input. Changes made to this setting occur immediately.
  - **Disabled:** Completely disables support for HDCP on this input.
  - **Follow Source:** Makes the input port support the same HDCP version as required by the connected source.
  - **Follow Display:** Makes the input support the HDCP version of the currently routed display(s).
- 6) Analogue Audio Output Source: Select the audio source for the analogue audio output.

Note: Only LPCM 2.0 sources are supported.

7) Analogue Audio Output Mute: Mute or unmute the analogue audio output.





#### 6.6.2 USB Settings Tab

This tab provides control over the settings for the USB ports on the unit.



- 1) USB Host setting: Enable or disable automatic selection of the USB host port.
- 2) USB-C Super Speed Selection: Select the operational mode of the USB Type-C port. When "Super Speed" is turned on, the Type-C port can support 4K30 A/V, Ethernet, and USB simultaneously. When "Super Speed" is turned off, the Type-C port will support full bandwidth 4K60 A/V content but USB data functionality will be limited to USB 2.0 levels.
- **3) USB Host Switch:** Select which USB host port is active on the internal USB hub. Selecting "SLOT" will make the CYP Module Card installed in the rear of the unit active. "Local USB-B" will make the Type-B port on the front of the unit active. Selecting "Local USB-C" will make the Type-C port on the rear of the unit active.





#### 6.6.3 Automation Tab

This tab provides control over the unit's automatic control command broadcast behavior when any of the specified Automation Events occur. Automation commands can control connected devices via CEC, RS-232, and Telnet.



Note: CEC events are only sent to the device connected to HDMI output

- 1) **Event:** Use the dropdown to select the Automation Event to configure. Available Automation Events are:
  - Power On: This unit is powered on.
  - **Out A Source Active:** The currently selected input changes from inactive to active.
  - **Out A Source Lost:** The currently selected input changes from active to inactive.
- 2) **CEC:** Enable or disable sending a CEC command when the currently selected Automation Event is activated.

Note: CEC support must also be enabled on the device connected to HDMI output A.

- Delay: Set the length of time, in seconds, that the specified Automation Event must continue to be true before sending the defined CEC command.
- Wait: Set the length of time, in seconds, to wait after this Automation Event has been activated before ANY other Automation Event can be detected.

- CEC Command: Set the CEC command to send when the specified Automation Event is activated. Click the "Test" button to send the command immediately. Available CEC commands are:
  - Power Off: Turn off the connected HDMI display device.
  - Power On: Turn on the connected HDMI display device.
  - Active Source: Force the connected HDMI display device to switch to the HDMI input that this unit is connected to.

Note: Not all HDMI devices support all CEC commands.

**3)** RS-232: Enable or disable sending an RS-232 command when the currently selected Automation Event is activated. Click the "Edit" icon (♣) to configure the RS-232 port.

- Delay: Set the length of time, in seconds, that the specified Automation Event must continue to be true before sending the defined RS-232 command.
- Wait: Set the length of time, in seconds, to wait after this Automation Event has been activated before ANY other Automation Event can be detected.
- **RS232 Command:** Click the Edit icon (☆) to define the RS-232 command to send when the specified Automation Event is activated. Click the "Test" button to send the command immediately.

4) Telnet: Enable or disable sending a Telnet command to the designated IP address when the currently selected Automation Event is activated. Click the "Edit" icon (象) to configure the target IP address and communication port. If the target Telnet device requires a login to receive commands, those details may be added as well.

- Delay: Set the length of time, in seconds, that the specified Automation Event must continue to be true before sending the defined Telnet command.
- Wait: Set the length of time, in seconds, to wait after this Automation Event has been activated before ANY other Automation Event can be detected.
- **Telnet Command:** Click the Edit icon (☆) to define the Telnet command to send when the specified Automation Event is activated. Click the "Test" button to send the command immediately.

#### 6.6.4 EDID Tab

This tab provides control over the EDID settings of all inputs. This unit provides the option of six standard EDIDs, two sink sourced EDIDs and three user uploaded EDIDs that can be assigned to one input or all inputs as a group. The names of the user uploaded EDIDs can be changed if desired.

- 1) User EDID
  - Upload: To upload a User EDID, select the User EDID slot to upload into from the dropdown list and then click the "Upload" button. An EDID Upload window will appear, allowing you to locate and upload the preferred EDID file (\*.bin format) from a local PC. Once the correct file has been selected, please click the "Upload" button in the window, and the file will be transferred to the unit.
  - Download: To save an existing User EDID to your local PC, select the User EDID slot from the dropdown list and then press the "Download" button. Depending on your browser settings you will either be asked where to save the downloaded file, or the file will be transferred to the default download location on your PC.
  - Edit Name: Click the "Edit Name" button to open a window that allows changing the name of the User EDID. Click the "Save Change" button within the window to confirm the change.





#### 2) Output EDID

Download: To save the EDID from a connected display to your local PC, select the output from the dropdown list then press the "Download" button. Depending on your browser settings you will either be asked where to save the downloaded file, or the file will be transferred to the default download location on your PC.

#### 3) Input EDID

EDID Selection: Click on an input button to open the EDID Table List window. Select the new EDID source to use, from the choices on the right, and the change will occur immediately across all selected Inputs.

Note: The EDID of SLOT will be different depends on the specification of the card.

Note: In some rare cases it is possible for custom or external EDIDs to cause compatibility issues with certain sources. If this happens, it is recommended to switch to one of the 6 default EDIDs for maximum compatibility.

This tab provides network configuration options including changing the IP mode, viewing/setting the IP configuration, changing the admin login password, and changing the Web Login timeout.

1) IP Configuration: IP Mode may be switched between Static IP or DHCP. In Static IP Mode the IP, netmask and gateway addresses may be manually set. When in DHCP Mode, the unit will attempt to connect to a local DHCP server and obtain IP, netmask and gateway addresses automatically. Please press "Save" after making any changes to the IP configuration or mode.

Note: If the IP address is changed then the IP address required for WebGUI/ Telnet access will also change accordingly.

2) Web Login Account: The WebGUI admin password can be changed here. Please press "Save" after entering the old and new passwords to enact the change.

Note: The default password is "admin".

3) Web Login Timeout: Select the length of time to wait before logging the user out of the WebGUI due to inactivity. Available range is from 0 to 65535 minutes. Setting it to 0 will disable the timeout function.

This tab provides serial number information, system configuration backup/restore/reset, system reboot, and firmware update functions.

- 1) System Configuration
  - Download: The current system configuration, including routing and settings, may be saved as an XML file to a PC. Click the "Download" button to save the current system configuration to your local PC.
  - Restore: Previously saved system configurations may be restored from a saved XML file. Click the "Choose File" button to locate the saved XML file, then click the "Restore" button to upload and activate the selected configuration.
- 2) Factory Reset: Press the "All Reset" button to reset the unit to its factory default state. After the reset is complete, the unit will reboot automatically.
- 3) System Reboot: Click this button to reboot the unit.
- 4) Firmware Upgrade: To update the unit's firmware, click the "Choose File" button to open the file selection window and then select the firmware update file (\*.bin format) located on your local PC. After selecting the file, click the "Upgrade" button to begin the firmware update process. After the upgrade is complete, the unit will reboot automatically.
- 5) Serial Number: Displays the unit's serial number.





#### 6.6.7 Module Tab

The module tab(s) provides additional functions for the SDM branded module card, improving unit integration. The information and setting options will be shown differently base on the module card installed on this unit.

Note: This tab will be visible when a compatible SDM branded module card is installed on the unit.

#### **6.7 Telnet Control**

Before attempting to use Telnet control, please ensure that both the unit and the PC are connected to the same active networks.

Start your preferred Telnet/Console client, or use the built in client provided by most modern computer operating systems. After starting the client, connect by using the current IP address of the unit and port 23 (if the communication port number used by the unit has not been changed previously). This will connect us to the unit we wish to control and commands may now be entered directly.

Note 1: If the IP address of the unit is changed then the IP address required for Telnet access will also change accordingly.

Note 2: This unit defaults to DHCP mode, the current IP address can be verified via RS-232 if the Device Discovery software is not available. The default communication port is 23.


